
Director

West Virginia Lottery

John C. Musgrave of Point Pleasant, WV, was appointed Director of the West Virginia Lottery in April 1997 and has had four consecutive appointments since that time. Musgrave brings to the Lottery a strong finance background with more than two decades of public service at the federal, state and local levels.

As Lottery Director, he oversees a special revenue agency that generates approximately \$1.4 billion in gross sales annually, and provides a profit to the State of West Virginia of more than \$645 million to fund programs for senior citizens, education, parks, tourism and capital projects.

On February 1, 2013, Musgrave was appointed Deputy Secretary of Revenue. In this capacity, he now oversees the Lottery, Racing Commission, Alcohol Beverage Control Administration and the Athletic Commission.



Lottery Commission

The Commission was created in 1985 to assist and advise the Director of the Lottery, and to carry on a continuous study of West Virginia Lottery operations throughout the state. Members are appointed by the Governor with the approval of the Senate. In accordance with state law, the Lottery Commission is required to have seven members comprised of a lawyer, a certified public accountant, a computer expert, a marketing specialist, and one member with not less than five years experience in law enforcement. An additional two members represent the "public at large." No more than four members may be from the same political party. Unless filling an unexpired appointment, members serve overlapping terms of five years and are eligible for successive appointments to the Commission.

Schools and Education

More than \$2.7 billion in West Virginia Lottery proceeds have been used to strengthen public education in West Virginia since the Lottery began operations in 1986. These proceeds have improved public education at every level by providing new and improved schools through the West Virginia School Building Authority, placing computers in the classrooms through efforts of the West Virginia Department of Education, and providing higher education opportunities for students through funding for the PROMISE Scholarship program.

In FY 2013, the State of West Virginia received a total of \$126.6 million of Lottery proceeds for Education, and an additional \$29 million for the PROMISE scholarship program.




The West Virginia Lottery has generated more than \$828.3 million for West Virginia Seniors. These proceeds have provided a wide range of care and services, which have helped the West Virginia Bureau of Senior Services provide more than two million meals annually to seniors at county nutrition sites and homes across the State. This funding has also assisted with long-term care needs, senior centers, transportation needs, aided in matching Medicaid funding for senior services, and has helped senior citizens with the expense of property taxes using a property tax credit for West Virginia seniors.

A total of \$52.8 million in Lottery proceeds was directed to support West Virginia Seniors in FY 2013.

Tourism and State Parks

"The Division of Tourism works hard to maximize each dollar the Lottery Commission invests with the agency. Nearly 15 million overnight visitors choose West Virginia as their vacation destination because of the variety of locations, events, and activities we offer. This choice is reflected in the \$5.1 billion spent by travelers in West Virginia in 2012, a new record level. That spending supports over 46,400 travel industry jobs, which impacts individuals and families."

West Virginia's growing tourism industry has received more than \$805.7 million in Lottery proceeds since 1986. Lottery dollars are used in a matching grants program established with the West Virginia Division of Tourism, and directed to areas including the West Virginia State Park Improvement Fund and the Division of Natural Resources.

In FY 2013, a total of \$45.9 million in Lottery proceeds were used for the promotion of Tourism across the State.

Traditional Lottery Products

WEST VIRGINIA POWER

POWERBALL® sales for FY2013 totaled approximately \$48.7 million which represented 24.9% of total traditional Lottery sales.

POWERBALL® is an on-line game jointly operated by 42 state lotteries, the District of Columbia and the Virgin Islands, who are members of the Multi-State Lottery Association (MUSL) or the Mega Millions® Group. This game was introduced in April 1992. Drawings are held twice weekly on Wednesday and Saturday.







The Powerball® game delivered in a big way for three West Virginia families in fiscal year 2013. Terry Brumfield of Harts, Mary Carr of Barboursville and Doug Gillispie & Family from Julian all won \$1 million, match 5 prizes.



MEGA MILLIONS® is an on-line game jointly operated by 42 state lotteries, the District of Columbia and the Virgin Islands, with the majority of member states also belonging to the same group that operates POWERBALL®. Mega Millions® offers eight secondary prizes of fixed amounts ranging from \$2 to \$250,000. Drawings are held twice weekly on Tuesday and Friday.

Mega Millions® sales for FY2013 was approximately \$9.3 million which accounted for 4.7% of traditional Lottery sales.

HOT LOTTO SIZZLER® is an on-line game jointly operated by 14 states and the District of Columbia who are members of MUSL. HOT LOTTO SIZZLER® offers eight secondary prizes of fixed amounts ranging from \$2 to \$30,000.

HOT LOTTO SIZZLER® sales for FY2013 was approximately \$5,063,704 which accounted for 2.6% of traditional Lottery sales.





INSTANT games were the Lottery's first type of game introduced in January 1986. The instant game offers a wide variety of game themes. During fiscal year 2013, there were 45 new games introduced.

Instant Game sales for FY2013 totaled more than \$108.6 million which was 55.6% of traditional Lottery sales.



DAILY 3 is an on-line game introduced in February of 1987. Players choose three numbers from 0 to 9 for prizes ranging from \$40 to \$500. Drawings are held six nights a week.



DAILY 4 is an on-line game also introduced in February of 1987. Players choose four numbers from 0 to 9 for prizes ranging from \$100 to \$5,000. Drawings are held six nights a week.



CASH25 is an on-line game, which was introduced in February 1990. Players pick six numbers from 1 to 25 for a chance to win cash prizes ranging from \$1 to \$25,000. Drawings are held four nights a week every Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday.

Daily 3 sales for FY2013 totaled \$8.3 million which accounted for 4.3% of traditional Lottery sales.

Daily 4 sales for FY2013 totaled more than \$4.7 million which was 2.4% of traditional Lottery sales.

Cash25 sales for FY2013 totaled more than \$5.2 million which was 2.7% of traditional Lottery sales.



TRAVEL KENO is a game restricted to lottery retailers with specific types of West Virginia Alcohol Beverage Control Administration licenses and was introduced in December 1992. The winning numbers are displayed on monitors at 305 Travel Keno locations.

> Travel Keno sales for FY2013 totaled \$5.7 million was approximately 2.9% of traditional Lottery sales.

Promotions and Events



The West Virginia Lottery marketing staff stays busy year round with a variety of special promotions and events across the state. Each August, the State Fair of West Virginia becomes the largest lottery retailer in the state for the entire month and in 2012 the Lottery sponsored West Virginia native Landau Eugene Murphy in concert on Lottery Day.

Lucky the leprechaun, the star of a recent advertising campaign, made an appearance at the Charleston Town Center on St. Patrick's Day. Hundreds of Lottery players had the opportunity to meet their favorite leprechaun and had a chance to enter the Lottery's Cash Vault. The Cash Vault was also featured at dozens of promotions across the state.

Video, Racetrack and **Table Games**









RACETRACK VIDEO LOTTERY games were implemented in 1994 when the West Virginia Legislature passed the Racetrack Video Lottery Act, making video lottery terminals available to the four racetracks in the state subject to passage of local referendums. In September 1994, three racetracks (Mountaineer Casino Racetrack & Resort, Wheeling Island Hotel, Casino & Racetrack, and Mardi Gras Casino & Resort) began operating with 1,200 video lottery machines. A fourth racetrack (Hollywood Casino at Charles Town Races) began video gaming in September 1997. As of June 30, 2013, the West Virginia Lottery Commission had an average of 7,796 terminals available for play at the four racetracks in the state. Racetrack Video Lottery sales were 49.4 percent of total 2013 sales.





LIMITED VIDEO LOTTERY games were approved by the Legislature in April 2001. The legislation provides up to 9,000 video lottery terminals to be placed in retailer locations with specific types of West Virginia Alcohol Beverage Control Administration licenses. West Virginia is one of three state lotteries to regulate and operate limited video lottery. Limited video lottery sales were 30.1 percent of total 2013 sales at 1,526 operating retailer locations.

TABLE GAMES were implemented in fiscal year 2008 when the West Virginia Legislature passed the Racetrack Table Games Act, making table games available to the four racetracks in the state subject to passage of local referendums. In October 2007, two racetracks (Mountaineer Casino Racetrack & Resort and Wheeling Island Hotel, Casino & Racetrack) began operating with poker tables only and added full table games in December 2007. In August 2008, a third racetrack (Mardi Gras Casino & Resort) began operating with poker tables only and added full table games in October 2008. The fourth racetrack (Hollywood Casino at Charles Town Races) began operating full table games on July 1, 2010. Games offered are Poker, Blackjack, Caribbean Stud, Craps, Roulette, Three and Four Card Poker, and other miscellaneous games.






HISTORIC RESORT implemented video lottery and table games came about in fiscal year 2010 when the West Virginia Legislature passed the Casino Act, which also required the passage of local referendum. In October 2009, The Greenbrier began operating both video lottery and table games. Table Games offered are Blackjack, Roulette and Three Card Poker.








Lottery Sales By Product Last Ten Years






